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Executive Session Synchronous Meeting

Monday, 17 November 7-9pm UTC

538 Welcome, housekeeping and review of previous action items

Renate Behrens welcomed everyone and expressed a warm welcome to Jack Ennis Butler, attending his first RSC Meeting as Representative for Oceania, and to Getaneh Alemu, observing the meeting as Wider Community Engagement Officer Elect. She also expressed the sadness of the whole RSC that this would be the last meeting attended by Charlene Chou as Wider Community Engagement Officer¹ and Colleen Barbus as RDA Board Chair. Renate was happy to report that all action items have been completed or were in progress.

539 Update from the Board

Colleen Barbus reported the membership changes on the Board. She thanked Haliza Jailani, National Institution Representative for Asia for her service, and highlighted her outreach work in the region with Charlene Chou. Haliza's place will be taken by a colleague from the National Library Board, Singapore. She also thanked Christian Aliverti for his service as National Institution Representative for Europe. His place has been taken by Hannes Lowagie. She is grateful that Christian has agreed to continue his work on the Working Groups on which he is serving, and that he and Hannes have completed a smooth transition. Recruitment has started for National Institution Representatives for Africa and the USA. Renate Behrens and James Hennelly echoed Colleen's thanks to outgoing members and welcome to new members of the Board. The next meeting of the Board takes place in December and one of the topics on the Agenda is the Board's Strategic Plan. The RSC Secretary thanked Colleen for working on this in a timely manner this year, since the RSC Chair and she will be working on the RSC's Annual Plan to go before the RSC in its first meeting of 2026. Renate Behrens echoed the importance of being able to present the draft to the RSC at its next meeting, and hoped that the Board would agree their Strategic Plan in December. James Hennelly thanked Colleen for her work on this and for all her work during her term as Board Chair. From 1 January 2026, the role of Chair will rotate to Chris Oliver, Copyright Holder for the Canadian Federation of Library Associations. Colleen will remain on the Board as Copyright Holder for the American Library Association.

540 Update from ALA Digital Reference

James Hennelly reported that the October Release was completed on time, with a few technical issues that were resolved. There are corrections and fixes based on feedback submitted to RDA Toolkit and changes to the Guidance chapter on Aggregates. Policy statements have been added by the British Library, Library and Archives Canada, and the New Zealand National Library. This release also introduces the policy statements from the Rare Books and Materials Section (RBMS). Toolkit subscribers [can read the full release notes](#). The Spanish translation debuted in

this release². The October Release is the final one under our new publishing calendar. Next year, the release schedule will follow the same pattern, with releases in February, June, and October. In each release the English-language version is published first, and the translations will follow in the weeks after. James also shared updates on the development work ALA Digital Reference is currently carrying out. This will remain business confidential until it is closer to completion.

541 Updates from Working Groups

541.1 Task and Finish / Advisory Working Groups

541.1.1 RDA Board / RSC Working Group on Artificial Intelligence (AI)

Working Group Chair Ahava Cohen shared that a current challenge faced by institutions using AI in cataloguing is AI Drift. An interesting discussion ensued. Ahava also reported that they are still receiving numerous requests for a “Minimal Set”. After an intense discussion on the pros and cons of this approach, Renate Behrens asked Chris Holden, Technical Team Liaison Officer, if the Technical Working Group could look into this. Both Renate and James are aware of the strong opinions on each side of this debate, but are mindful that the last time it was raised the Technical Working Group advised against a Minimal Description Set. Is there anything that can be done, since so many requests are received from the wider RDA cataloguing community? Renate highlighted that the next step currently underway in the AI Working Group is to suggest updated tasks to the Board and RSC. Ahava Cohen agreed to update the tasks ahead of the next Board meeting and then bring them to the next RSC Meeting. The Secretary provided Ahava with the number for the updated Terms of Reference – RSC/Chair/2026/4.

541.1.1.1 ACTION: Ahava Cohen to invite Chris Holden to the next meeting of the AI Working Group; Chris to observe AI Working Group and report back, firstly to the Technical Working Group for them to discuss the issues and then to the RSC.

541.1.1.2 ACTION: Ahava Cohen to present DRAFT RSC/Chair/2026/4 – Working Group on Artificial Intelligence, 2026 to the RDA Board in December 2025 and the RSC Meeting in January 2026. This will ultimately replace RSC/Chair/2025/10 – Working Group on Artificial Intelligence, 2025³

541.1.2 RSC Working Group on Extent

Renate thanked the Working Group for introducing its proposals at this Meeting (See [Item 548](#)). She shared with the RSC that rather than seeking an extension to the Working Group, she had obtained an agreement from its Chair, Thomas Brenndorfer, to form a new Working Group on

String Encoding Schemes (SES) and to recruit appropriate members of the Extent Working Group to join it. It is clear from the Extent Working Group's proposals that SES form a significant part of them, and so the first task for the SES Working Group will be to implement the Extent proposals in conjunction with the Technical Team Liaison Officer and Secretary as appropriate. If any of the Extent proposals are rejected by the RSC in the January Meeting, the Extent Working Group's Terms of Reference will include reacting to this (whether by drafting further proposals or offering alternative potential solutions). DRAFT Terms of Reference for the SES Working Group will be presented to the RSC in the January meeting after the Extent Working Group's proposals have been discussed. The RSC agreed unanimously with the plan to discharge the Extent Working Group on the understanding that the SES Working Group will pick up any of its remaining workload. Renate thanked Thomas and the rest of the Extent Working Group for the huge amount of work they have undertaken and she thanked those who are willing to join the SES Working Group. In response to a question, she confirmed that a call for new additional members of the SES Working Group will be issued after the January RSC Meeting, when it is clear how much work is needed to complete Extent work.

541.1.2.1 **ACTION:** Chair and Secretary to liaise with incoming SES Working Group Chair on DRAFT Terms of Reference ahead of the January RSC Meeting.

541.1.2.2 **ACTION:** Secretary to prepare a DRAFT discharge document for presentation at the January RSC Meeting, and to update it subject to the outcome of discussions of the Extent proposals in that meeting⁴.

541.1.3 RSC Working Group on Religions in RDA

Renate Behrens thanked David Roth and the members of the Religions Working Group for their proposal under discussion at this meeting ([Item 546](#)), and their continued hard work. As an Advisory Working Group on such an important topic for the internationalization of RDA, the Working Group will continue in 2026. A DRAFT updated Terms of Reference document will be presented in the next RSC Meeting.

541.1.3.1 **ACTION:** Chair and Secretary to liaise with David Roth, Working Group Chair, on DRAFT updated Terms of Reference ahead of the January RSC Meeting.

541.2 RSC Examples Working Group

RDA Examples Editor Jessica Grzegorski highlighted the future actions section of her annual report ([Item 549.5](#)). She and James Hennelly discussed the practicalities of the full example sets the Working Group has been creating. Renate Behrens thanked them for this update, and, on behalf of the rest of the RSC, thanked the Examples Working Group members for all their hard work.

541.3 Technical Working Group

Technical Team Liaison Officer Chris Holden shared with the RSC his forthcoming public update on RSC/TechnicalWG/2025/1 – Discussion paper on soft-deprecated parallel elements⁵. He also highlighted recent work on the Registry and shared that the Working Group is continuing to look at the work undertaken by organisations who are currently implementing Official RDA. (See [Item 549.8](#) for his annual report).

541.4 Translations Working Group

Translations Team Liaison Officer Szabolcs Dancs highlighted his current work to finalise plans for a Webinar in February for RDA cataloguers in Central and Eastern Europe, and thanked the members of the RSC who have agreed to give presentations. Renate and James thanked Szabolcs for this important work to strengthen links in the region and James highlighted recent activities by ALA Digital Reference with colleagues there who are exploring translations and / or new subscriptions. He thanked Szabolcs for his ongoing work to represent the benefits of Official RDA with his colleagues in Hungary and nearby countries. Szabolcs also shared the work he and Jessica Grzegorski have been doing on an upcoming proposal. Initially planned for the January meeting, he said he was happy for it to be scheduled for April instead, to allow more space for the Extent proposals. He encouraged members of the RSC, especially new members, to read his annual report ([Item 549.9](#)) and get in touch if they have any questions about the work of the translators.

542 Meetings 2026

After extensive discussion, the following dates have been set for 2026 RSC Meetings:

Given the rotation of the Chair of the RDA Board from the US Copyright Holder to the Canadian Copyright Holder, Colleen Barbus suggested including incoming RDA Board Chair Chris Oliver in the discussions of time. Renate Behrens agreed to postpone setting the time of the Public Sessions for April, July and November until the Executive Session Synchronous Meeting in January.

542.1 **ACTION:** Secretary to contact Chris Oliver with the time of the Executive Session Synchronous Meeting in January and check she is able to attend.

Public Session, Tuesday, 18 November

543 Recorded presentation by Aimee Hay, Program Coordinator, National State Libraries Australasia on Official RDA Implementation

Renate Behrens introduced a recorded presentation on the NSLA Official RDA Project by Aimee Hay, Program Coordinator.⁷ Following this, she thanked Aimee for her insight into this excellent collaborative project.

544 RSC/NARDAC/2025/3 – Inconsistency in the transcribed manifestation elements related to source of information

Robert Maxwell introduced the proposal⁸ and responded to the issues raised by members of the RSC. He accepted the issues with soft-deprecated terms, and noting the Technical Working Group's objections, complied with the suggestion of the Chair and Secretary that RSC/NARDAC/2025/3 be treated as a Discussion Paper in order to decide on next steps. He stressed that the main point raised by NARDAC is that the instructions are confusing, and this is something that they would very much like to see resolved. He thanked those members of the RSC who offered help to carry it forward.

544.1 Technical issues

Chris thanked Robert for bringing these important issues to the table for discussion. He stressed that the Technical Working Group was not trying to halt improvements to the text of RDA. Having reviewed the elements in the proposal, the Technical Working Group were uncomfortable with their disparate nature, including shortcuts and elements including transcription but also going beyond transcription, as well as superelements (transcribed and not

transcribed together). Chris highlighted that some of the options in these elements exist as compromises to accommodate legacy data. As a result, a blanket change to all the elements in the proposal could have unintended negative consequences. However, Chris believes it will be possible to find a way forward – not by taking a blanket approach, but by tacking each issue separately to achieve coherence in the text of RDA, which NARDAC wants, without risking difficulties. He is very willing to collaborate with Robert and the new North America representative to take the intention behind the proposal forward.

544.2 Support from other RSC Members

Europe Representative Ahava Cohen said she values the intent to make everything explicit and then consolidate them. She observed an ever-present tension in cataloguing rules between explanation and concision. Oceania Representative Jack Ennis Butler agrees that there are inconsistencies in the text of RDA, as highlighted by the proposal. He shared that the National Library of New Zealand had made similar points based on their day-to-day practice during their implementation. In particular he mentioned the Data Provenance tables. He also echoed Ahava's point about explanation versus concision. Sometimes the text links through to another part of it, but it does not answer the cataloguer's query for which they are consulting the text. He and his ORDAC colleagues are happy to help carry the proposal forward. Ahava agreed that she was happy to do so too. Renate suggested that input from all the Regional Representatives would be valuable and Robert agreed.

544.3 Data Provenance a moot topic

Robert agreed wholeheartedly with Jack's example of Data Provenance, which often confuses the tasks of choosing and recording in its text. Chris agreed that we need to refine Data Provenance.

544.4 Examples are always meant to illustrate

Jessica Grzegorski offered her assistance as and when required to carry the intentions of the proposal forward. She also felt it important to restate that a core principle of RDA (as distinct from many earlier standards, including AACR and AACR2) is that examples are always meant to illustrate. Instructions should always be made clearer first, and then examples can be added. We do not want to end up with a situation in which instead of looking for principles to apply, cataloguers were searching for specific examples that matched their current situation exactly. Ahava Cohen agreed with this. She has been looking at the history of cataloguing rules, and they do tend to start concise with principles and then expand as more and more examples are added. It becomes time-consuming if cataloguers have to read through every single example in case there are implicit instructions within them.

544.5 The importance of Guidance pages

Education and Orientation Officer Elisa Sze raised the issue of Guidance pages. In training and teaching contexts, people are arriving from lots of different sources. They may or may not know

to read the Guidance pages first. It would be helpful, in the context of carrying the intentions of this proposal further, to identify Guidance pages for updating.

544.6 Next steps

Renate Behrens asked what were the next steps. It was decided that Robert and Chris would form a Rapid Action Group to find a way to carry the intentions of the proposal forward that will be effective from the Technical Working Group's point of view.

544.6.1 **ACTION:** Robert and Chris to form a Rapid Action Group, including the new North America Representative as soon as they are appointed, and drawing on the expertise of the other Regional Representatives, the Examples Editor and the Education and Orientation Officer as and when required.

544.6.2 **ACTION:** Robert to go back to NARDAC formally and explain that the intentions of their proposal will be carried forward, using mechanisms to be evaluated by the Rapid Action Group with advice from the Technical Working Group.

544.6.3 **ACTION:** Robert / the new North America Representative to report back (2-3 sentences) on progress at the January Meeting, and particularly whether a proposal will be forthcoming for the April or June meeting.

545 RSC/NARDAC/2025/4 – Scope note for Corporate Body

Robert Maxwell introduced the proposal.⁹ Noting the Technical Working Group's objections, complied with the suggestion of the Chair and Secretary that RSC/NARDAC/2025/4 be treated as a Discussion Paper in order to decide on next steps. He explained that the motivation behind the proposal had been to restore wording from Original RDA. Although he accepted that RSC/NARDAC/2025/4 was now being treated as a Discussion Paper, he wanted to record his disagreement with the Technical Working Group's reading of IFLA LRM as set out in RSC/NARDAC/2025/4/TTLO¹⁰.

545.1 LRM on Corporate Entities

Technical Team Liaison Officer Chris Holden stated that IFLA LRM talks about "Corporate Entities" rather than "Corporate Bodies" and stressed that compliance with the LRM was a core

principle of RDA. The Technical Working Group simply cannot approve deviation from the LRM.

545.2 Space for non-Anglo-American traditions

Europe Representative Ahava Cohen acknowledged that lists of the kind proposed by NARDAC are usual going back, at least, to the nineteenth century. The main feedback from EURIG members is that any such list should not be exhaustive so that scope is left for non-Anglo-American traditions.

545.3 First Nations and Collective Agents

Oceania Representative Jack Ennis Butler stated that a key issue from Oceania, and he expected other Regions in which information provision for First Nations was a priority, is that space is needed in the definition of Collective Agents for First Nations groups.

545.4 LRM on Collective Agents

Again, Chris stressed that RDA must remain in tandem with the IFLA LRM. It should not try to anticipate IFLA standards development. It would be far better to work within the terms of RSC/Chair/2023/3/rev – Protocol between the RSC and the IFLA Committee on Standards (CoS)¹¹ and provide feedback on this issue in terms of RDA development.

545.5 Comments from observers and next steps

The Chair opened the floor to observers and several spoke on the importance of First Nations representation and on the IFLA LRM. In particular, Pat Riva shared that in her experience working on the IFLA bodies that created and maintain the LRM, Collective Agent was envisaged as having two elements within it, Family and Corporate Body. She thanked the RSC for its determination to stay aligned with the LRM and offered to take our concerns to the relevant IFLA committee responsible for updating the LRM. Renate Behrens thanked her for this, which she feels an appropriate way forward, consistent with our protocol with the IFLA Committee on Standards¹². The Secretary asked Robert Maxwell if he would be prepared to take on the discussions with Pat in his first official action as RSC Chair Elect and he said he was very happy to liaise with Pat. Renate asked him to keep the Technical Team Liaison Officer and herself in the loop, and is very pleased to see Robert take on this action.

545.5.1 ACTION: Chair Elect to liaise with Pat Riva on behalf of the RSC and report back (2-3 sentences) at the January Meeting.

545.5.2 ACTION: Chair Elect to involve the Technical Team Liaison Officer and keep him apprised of any further information Pat requests and, if necessary, facilitate a meeting between Pat and the Technical Team Liaison Officer / Technical Working Group.

545.5.3 **ACTION:** Chair Elect to copy RSC Chair into correspondence so she can maintain a watching brief, since she is the official liaison to IFLA COS. After the Meeting, she requested that he also contact the Chair of the IFLA Bibliographic Conceptual Models (BCM) Review Group as a courtesy to keep her in the loop.

545.5.4 **ACTION:** Technical Team Liaison Officer to let the Technical Working Group know that under the protocol with IFLA COS the Chair Elect may ask him to organise a meeting between them, the Chair Elect and Pat Riva and / or may ask for documentation and / or opinions ahead of the January meeting.

546 RSC/ReligionsWG/2025/1 – Proposal to Revise Name of Corporate Body

As the Working Group Chair, David Roth, could not be present due to the very late hour of the meeting in his timezone, Renate Behrens introduced the proposal¹³. She said that reading through the official responses, her sense was that there was general approval of the proposal.

546.1 Further work and suggestions

North America Representative Robert Maxwell said that while there was general approval, he had concerns about whether we would need to relocate the current changes as part of the ongoing work now taking place following the NARDAC discussion papers (Items [544](#) and [545](#)). He also felt that it was clear that more discussion was needed on the glossary definition(s) for “real or official name”.

546.2 Glossary definitions

Technical Team Liaison Officer Chris Holden said that he was aware that the suggested glossary definitions he had suggested in RSC/ReligionsWG/2025/1/TTLO¹⁴ were too much to be voted on the basis of a response, but when he had looked into the glossary definitions in this area, he had discovered issues that should be resolved. He had offered the suggestions in his official response not as final solutions but as a route into discussing the issue. He agreed with Robert that the upcoming work following the NARDAC discussion papers plus the need for clarity on definitions may mean that the current proposal was only a placeholder for a more extensive overhaul. He did, however, want to thank the Religions Working Group for working so quickly to bring a concise and thought-provoking proposal to the table.

546.3 Implementation “for now”

Following a wide-ranging discussion among the RSC and some useful comments from observers, Europe Representative Ahava Cohen said that in the interests of improving the experience for cataloguers in the short-term while the Religions Working Group and Technical Working Group worked together on the glossary definitions and NARDAC and the Technical

Working Group worked together on progressing the ideas behind the NARDAC discussion papers, she thought it would be best to approve the current proposal knowing that the individual instructions may well move in the fullness of time. Renate Behrens took a vote and voting members of the RSC agreed unanimously with this practical suggestion.

546.4 After the Public Session

Following the Public Session, there was some discussion amongst RSC members in the asynchronous part of the Executive Session. This was centred on practicalities. The Regional Representatives expressed a strong desire to be included in discussions on this topic going forward. Oceania Representative Jack Ennis Butler highlighted the importance of coverage that is meaningful in a First Nations context.

546.5 Next steps

546.5.1 **ACTION:** Secretary to draft and implement RSC/ReligionsWG/2025/1/Decisions¹⁵

546.5.2 **ACTION:** Technical Working Group to work with Religions in RDA Working Group on glossary definitions

546.5.3 **ACTION:** Technical Team Liaison Officer to ensure that all Regional Representatives are included in these discussions at the appropriate points, so that their local perspectives can be given full and due consideration¹⁶.

547 Update on soft-deprecated terms

Technical Team Liaison Officer Chris Holden introduced RSC/TechnicalWG/2025/1 – Discussion paper on soft-deprecated parallel elements¹⁷. It includes links to earlier discussions so that members of the RDA community can locate the current discussion within the lengthy and ongoing conversations around soft-deprecated terms. It also presents examples of catalogue metadata sets to provide community members with ideas of how some institutions have dealt with issues without using the soft-deprecated terms.

As well as paying tribute to members of the Working Group - Gordon Dunsire, Deborah Fritz, Szabina Ilácsa, Damian Iseminger, Ricardo Santos Muñoz, Stefan Schuh - Chris thanked members of the wider RDA community who have been so willing to engage in discussions about soft-deprecated terms already. He hopes that the Discussion Paper presents options for parallel elements that will assist in moving towards next steps, and is really looking forward to

548 Update by Extent Working Group Chair Thomas Brenndorfer

Renate Behrens welcomed the Chair of the Extent Working Group Thomas Brenndorfer and thanked him for the difficult intellectual work he and the rest of the Working Group have carried out. Thomas introduced a suite of 8 proposals, acknowledging with thanks the support of the Technical Working Group as well as the members of the Extent Working Group. In the last year they have undertaken a review of all the feedback on last year's Discussion Paper (RSC/ExtentWG/2024/1/rev2¹⁹), which he advises the community to read along with its minuted discussion²⁰ (RSC/Minutes/483-499 Item 488) before reading the proposals. He also advises reading all 8 proposals through once before taking a deep dive into each one.

The Secretary shared RSC/FT2025-6, which sought explicit permission from the RSC to implement changes that she believed could be inferred from [RSC/FT2025-1/Decisions](#), but in which she was, as always, cautious of accidentally overstepping her editorial authority. All voting members of the RSC approved the changes.

ACTION: Secretary to draft and implement RSC/FT2025-6/Decisions.

551 Update to ISSN Protocol

Renate Behrens shared that the DRAFT protocol (which will be RSC/2026/3) is currently with the ISSN International Centre for their consideration. We hope to receive an updated draft in time for the next RSC Meeting.

552 Annual Report 2025

The annual reports from individuals will feed into the DRAFT of the Annual Report, which the Chair and Secretary will compile for presentation in the January Meeting. Renate Behrens thanked everyone for their prompt completion and submission of their annual reports, which is a big help with this task.

553 Action Plan 2026

Alongside the annual report, the Chair and Secretary will compile a DRAFT Action Plan. The Secretary asked for clarification on some of the items on the Action Plan 2025 and received it from the Technical Team Liaison Officer, *viz*:

1.e. First the Technical Working Group, then the RSC:

- Complete BIBFRAME mapping (2025)

A member of the Technical Working Group has done some initial work on BIBFRAME mappings. However, BIBFRAME remains under development, and different institutions have been working with different BIBFRAME implementations, which has made it difficult to for progress to be made. With the recent protocol between the RSC and SHARE-VDE, I hope that a stable implementation can be identified in 2026 to begin mapping RDA to BIBFRAME in earnest.

- Review the concept of performance aggregates (amalgamation instructions) (2025-2026)

This will be a good project for the Technical Working Group to talk to the Music Working Group about in 2026, though the concept is also wider than just music.

1.h. Further the development of RDA concepts (in line with the IFLA LRM) (2025-2027)

The Technical Working Group has had discussions about joint pseudonyms, and new relationship elements for aggregating expressions, the latter of which will yield a proposal in 2026. The recent discussion about a NARDAC proposal on corporate bodies demonstrates a need to continue the development of the collective agent and timespan elements in 2026 to align with the IFLA LRM.

The Technical Working Group has also provided feedback in 2025 to IFLA's BCM Review Group tasked with reviewing the IFLA LRM.

The Secretary thanked the Technical Team Liaison Officer for this clarification, which will assist very much in compiling the Action Plan 2026.

ACTION: Chair to inform Music Working Group of the potential to include BIBFRAME work with the Technical Working Group when they are clarifying their Terms of Reference. The Technical Team Liaison Officer will be *ex officio* on the Music Working Group, so although the issue is a wider one than music, it makes sense for him to start here.

554 Operations Documents

The Chair and Secretary are working on a restructure of the Operations Documents to make them easier to understand for new members. They presented their suggested plans, which were approved unanimously by members of the RSC. There was a very useful conversation between the Translations Team Liaison Officer and the Director of ALA Digital Reference on updating the documents supporting the translations process, with the Director of ALA Digital Reference volunteering to provide a review of the current processes. He also stated that the RSC Representative for Latin America and the Caribbean is very much up-to-date on these processes.

ACTION: Director of ALA Digital Reference to review translations processes ahead of January Meeting, keeping Translations Team Liaison Officer informed of progress.

555 AOB (Any Other Business) and thanks from the Chair

555.1 Development of Guidance for Collections

The Education and Orientation Officer raised a query about developing a Guidance page for Collections, particularly in the context of describing “bound with” items. After some discussion, it was agreed that she would join the Archives Working Group *ex officio* so she could work with them at the appropriate time to develop this page. Renate Behrens thanked her for doing so.

ACTION: Secretary to inform the Archives Working Group Chair, for inclusion in 2026 Terms of Reference document, and Education and Orientation Officer to maintain a watching brief.

555.2 Catalogue & Index May 2026

The Chair and Secretary were ahead of schedule in setting up a Basecamp page²² to manage submissions for the issue that Dr Karen Pierce and Fran Frenzel, editors, have commissioned from us to coincide with the beginning of the Countdown Clock in May 2026. The Secretary shared the link with members, and asked them to submit proposals for their 1,000-2,000 pieces.

ACTION: RSC Members to check the *C&I* draft contributions page and confirm their pieces / submit proposals by January 2026. The Secretary will set up to do items for everyone. The date to complete final drafts is end of March 2026, so the

RDA Board activities November 2024 – October 2025

Strategic plan

Work on the 2026-2028 Strategic Plan continues, with the RDA Board discussing a draft version at their September 2025 meeting. A revised version of the document will be presented to the RSC for final review, and a vote of final approval will be held during the December 2025 RDA Board meeting.

RDA Latin America and Caribbean Group

The RDA Board formally approved the creation of the RDA Latin America and Caribbean Group (RDA LAC Group)/ Grupo RDA América Latina y el Caribe (Grupo RDA ALyC) at their May 2025 meeting, with formal establishment of the group in June 2025.

Companion subscription level

The RDA Board approved the RDA Companion Subscription level at their May 2025 meeting, with the new option rolled out in June 2025. The Companion Subscription provides permission to create and publish online cataloging manuals derived from the RDA Standard, and will require annual renewal.

An addendum for companion subscriptions was added to the RDA Toolkit subscription user license agreement.

Transition to Official RDA Toolkit

At the December 2024 meeting, the RDA Board finalized and approved the following dates for the Original RDA Toolkit countdown clock:

- Start of clock: Monday, 11th May 2026
- End of clock: Tuesday, 11th May 2027

The countdown clock was originally announced in May 2023, with the goal of giving Toolkit users ample time to transition to Official RDA. The end date of the countdown clock signifies the final shutdown of the Original RDA Toolkit, after which the website will no longer be accessible.

- Scheduled and led monthly meetings of the RDA Examples Working Group.
- Participated in monthly meetings of the RSC Executive Committee and quarterly RSC meetings.

Working Group tasks and accomplishments

549.7 Report of the Wider Community Engagement Officer

Summary

This report presents an overview of Charlene Chou’s activities from November 2024 to October 2025 and highlights her work in the following categories: outreach activities, MARC Advisory Committee meetings, and working groups. This is Charlene’s fourth and final report, marking the conclusion of her second term. It has been a privilege for her to serve on the RDA Steering Committee from 2021 to 2025.

Outreach activities

- For more information about WCEO activities and presentations, please see my [About page](#).
- Charlene created and maintains the outreach spreadsheet [internal RSC document], in collaboration with EOO and Translations team.

- Since December 2023, Charlene has been in communication with Ben Gu (National Library of China) and James (ALA) regarding the translation of the RDA Reference into Simplified Chinese. Ben completed the translations in 2024 and has revised some sections based on feedback. The updated version will be uploaded in the near future.
- Charlene communicated with the National Central Library (NCL) and James (ALA) to address their questions about translating the RDA Reference into Traditional Chinese. James provided NCL with the template for translating the RDA Reference, and NCL is currently working on it. They have completed translations for three RDA vocabularies—Content Type, Media Type, and Carrier Type. These Traditional Chinese translations were published in the RDA Registry in August 2025.
- Charlene reached out to the National Diet Library (NDL) of Japan, but they currently do not plan to provide a Japanese translation of the RDA Reference.
- With strong language support from colleagues at the Library of Congress, Charlene contacted the National Library of Korea (NLK) regarding a translation of the RDA Reference and received a very supportive response. The Korean Cataloguing Rules (KCR) are currently being revised to align with RDA and are expected to be released later this year. The revision is being carried out by the Cataloguing Committee of the Korean Library Association, with participation from the Deputy Director of the Metadata and Sustainable Access Division at NLK. In late February, the Deputy Director asked me to send him the [Policy for New Translations of RDA](#), and I've connected him with James to obtain the template and CSV file needed to move forward.
- While traveling in Asia from April 21 to May 2, Charlene followed up with colleagues involved in RDA, including promoting the translation of [RDA teaching and training tips](#). For example, the Traditional Chinese translation was completed and published on the [RDA Learning Resources page](#) in September 2025.
- Charlene communicated with Ben Gu about translating the *RDA Training & Teaching Tips* handout and he agreed to translate it promptly. The Chinese Simplified translation was published on the [RDA Learning Resources page](#) in October 2025.

MARC Advisory Committee meetings

- Charlene attended the MAC meetings held from January 29–30, 2025. Neither the RSC nor the Technical Working Group members identified any specific comments on the MAC proposals and discussion papers in the context of RDA. As a result, no official RSC responses were submitted for those proposals and papers.
- Charlene attended the MAC meetings held from June 25–26, 2025. She shared the proposals and discussion papers with the RSC and the Technical Working Group (TWG) for comments. The TWG chair and members conducted a thorough review and provided feedback. Charlene then posted the official RSC responses to the MAC listserv before the meetings.

Joint RDA Board and RSC Working Group on AI

- On behalf of the Joint RDA Board and RSC Working Group on AI, Charlene presented *Considering AI in the Growth of RDA: Joint RDA Board and RSC Working Group on Artificial Intelligence report, 2024-Sept. 2025* at the Latin American Cataloguing and Metadata Meeting on October 1, 2025. - On June 30, 2025, Charlene presented [Considering AI in the Growth of RDA: Joint RDA Board and RSC Working Group on Artificial Intelligence Report, 2024 - June 2025](#), at the RDA Linked Data Forum, ALA Annual Meeting, on behalf of the Joint RDA Board and RSC Working Group on Artificial Intelligence.
- To enhance collaboration with other international organisations, Charlene serves as the Joint RDA Board and RSC Working Group on AI representative on the [PCC Task Group for AI and Machine Learning in Cataloging and Metadata](#).
- Charlene presented the [PCC AI Task Group's progress report](#) at the Joint Group meeting on February 17, 2025.
- On March 20, 2025, Charlene shared the [draft PCC Guiding Principles for Use of AI and Machine Learning Technologies in Cataloguing and Metadata Work](#) with the Joint Working Group for feedback.
- Charlene shared the AI White Paper with the [PCC Task Group for AI and Machine Learning in Cataloging and Metadata](#) for discussion and feedback.

549.8 Report of the Technical Team Liaison Officer

The Technical Team Liaison Officer participated in the following activities this year:

- Worked with the Wider Community Engagement Officer to provide feedback on MARC proposals, and attended the June MARC Advisory Committee meeting in which proposals were discussed.
- Met with the RDA/MARC 21 Alignment Task Force to discuss the work of the task force and other outstanding issues relating to RDA and MARC.
- With the Past Officer, met with the Archives Working Group to discuss the collections model.
- Provided regular updates to the RDA Registry and Staff Registry, including making changes to the RDA Registry to allow for translated terms in Turkish and traditional Chinese.
- Implemented changes to content and terminology in the Registry resulting from proposals approved by the RSC.
- Provided feedback to IFLA's Bibliographic Conceptual Models Review Group on issues identified with the IFLA LRM.
- With the Extent Working Group, worked on a proposal to fix an issue with the Expression: Duration element, which will be part of the larger batch of upcoming proposals surrounding extent.
- Reviewed ideas and provided feedback for potential proposals from RSC constituents and the wider RDA cataloging community, including ideas for additional elements for representative expressions.
- Answered questions from RSC constituents and the wider RDA cataloging community, including questions regarding transliteration schemes in RDA, questions regarding elements for describing resources in a series, and questions surrounding joint pseudonyms.
- Prepared a plan to fully deprecate many of the soft-deprecated elements, and presented this plan to the RSC. As part of this plan, the Technical Working Group has been developing a draft discussion paper specifically addressing the parallel elements in RDA and the possibility of cataloging in a future environment without these elements. The plan is to publish the paper for discussion at a future RSC meeting in early 2026.

549.9 Report of the Translations Team Liaison Officer

Outreach activities

- Started to organize a webinar, in cooperation with the RSC, for experts mainly from Eastern and Middle Europe. Colleagues of bibliographic agencies (national libraries, library associations, union catalogue consortia, etc.) will be invited from Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, North-Macedonia, Poland, Romania, Serbia, Slovakia, Ukraine. The aim of the webinar is to provide some basic information on the standard and its translation and implementation. The event is planned for February 2026.
- Held an RDA workshop at the annual meeting of the Association of Librarians in Hungary in July. Contributed to courses on RDA held by the Hungarian Library Institute. Published an [e-book on introduction to RDA](#) in Hungarian.
- As the editor-in-chief of *Central European Library and Information Science Review* (CELISR), initiated and supported to publish an article about implementation of RDA in New-Zealand, the authors are Teresa Preston and Anoushka McGuire. The article is to be published in November/December 2025.
- Compiled a document titled 'Why to translate RDA? Benefits of translating RDA', sent it out to RSC members for feedback.
- Corresponded with Serbian colleagues about their interest in translating RDA.

Liaison activities

- Checked translations of RDA Reference. Created and sent new templates and diff reports to translator teams.
- Answered or mediated queries, comments and proposals from translators via email.
- Organized the work of the Hungarian translators working group.
- Updated the content of the RDA Translations wiki and the RDA Translation Resources folder (on Google Drive), including the information on RDA translation statuses. Complied a translators outreach information excel table to ease the communication with translators beyond Basecamp.
- Adjusted the member list on Basecamp,.
- Attended RSC Executive Meetings and participated at the asynchronous meetings of RSC via conference call. Other meetings were followed via consulting the recordings. Followed the work of other WGs, e.g. Examples WG.
- Worked on fast track proposals and editorial changes with RSC Secretary and Technical Team Liaison Officer.
- Forwarded the request for comment on the 2025 edition of the International Cataloguing Principles (ICP) to the Translation WG.

- Consulted with the Education and Orientation Officer and the Wider Community Engagement Officer on the translations of learning resources.
- Provided formal response to RSC/NARDAC/2025/1, RSC/EOO/2025/1 and RSC/NARDAC/2025/2.
- Created presentation for and organized RDA Translators' Meeting in the framework of the annual EURIG meeting. The meeting was held in Stockholm, in the last week of May. It included a brief overview on what happened in the translation field; a presentation by James Hennelly on scheduling releases; introduction of the new Technical Team Liaison Officer and Chair of the Technical Working Group; a presentation by RDA Examples Editor; a presentation by the Education and Orientation Officer on the materials to be translated. - Worked with Technical Team Liaison Officer on translation issues.
- Drafted a proposal on adding new elements, applicable to rare and old materials, to the RDA Toolkit, the corresponding new definitions to the Glossary, and the corresponding new properties to RDA Registry.

Goals for the coming year

- Continuing the organization and holding a webinar, in cooperation with the RSC, for experts mainly from Eastern and Middle Europe.
- Giving a momentum to outreach activities (mainly in Europe).
- Contributing and mediating between RSC and countries open to provide venue for RSC meetings in the future.
- Organizing further online meetings for the teams to refresh their knowledge regarding translation procedures, if needed.
- Continuing the organizations of translation and implementation activities in Hungary.

Translations

EURIG members continue to be the largest group of full and partial translators of the Official Toolkit, under the guidance of the Translations Working Group Chair, EURIG representative for the National Széchényi Library Szabolcs Dancs. Therefore it is only natural that the annual Translators' meeting was held, as it usually is, in conjunction with the EURIG annual meeting.

Additional Presentations

As in previous years, EURIG members have brought their interest in RDA and IFLA-LRM in to conferences and presentations held under other auspices, including the [European BIBFRAME Workshop](#).

Several EURIG members have organized events around RDA topics, including:

Belgium:

- Work has begun to bring together people and organisations that work on/with RDA together. A first draft webpage for the initiative is available at https://opac.kbr.be/BRIDGE.aspx?_lg=en-GB

England:

- The British Library completed phase one of its RDA implementation for the new Toolkit. This involved the rollout of orientation and practice materials to staff at the St Pancras and Boston Spa sites over the summer months. The training cohort was mainly cataloguer focused, but also included some senior management, curatorial and technical support roles. The British Library has developed its own set of policy statements in the new RDA Toolkit as well as application profiles and detailed policy guidance hosted locally on SharePoint. Phase two of implementation is set to commence in the New Year following the library's ALMA LMS implementation. Remaining activities include orientations for other support roles (e.g. acquisitions) and senior management more generally. Phase two will also include the refinement of existing policy documentation and development of additional policy where necessary. As contributors to various communities of practice and as one point in a larger metadata supply chain, the British

Library will also be seeking to coordinate its roll out with third parties nationally and internationally.

Germany:

- The German National Library the Office for Library Standards coordinates the maintenance and development of the RDA DACH standard for the DACH region which is presented on the [STA documentation platform](#). Michaela Edelmann of DNB gave a talk about the platform at the 22nd January public session of the RSC. Content changes for the STA documentation platform are developed cooperatively by the STA working groups, in which the German National Library is also involved.
 - Release 2025/1 was published in July with changes and additions for RDA DACH: [STA documentation platform / RDA DACH](#).
 - In September an update for authority data was published: Entity descriptions were added and RDA elements concerning the entities person, family, corporate body and place were integrated in the [GND](#) section of the STA documentation platform. Examples were enriched with format information for authority data (e.g. the preferred name of corporate body <https://sta.dnb.de/doc/RDA-E-K010/#Erfassen-des-bevorzugten-Namens-einer-Körperschaft>).
 - Currently preparing release 2025/2 for RDA DACH and also GND is being prepared. It will be published on December 5, 2025.

Greece:

- Michalis Gerolimos of the National Library of Greece gave a talk about the Greek implementation of RDA at the 15th July public session of the RSC

Israel:

- The 10th Annual Catalogers Day was attended by nearly 250 catalogers from across the country and celebrated a decade of RDA in Israel

Italy:

The URBE network, composed of 20 Roman ecclesiastical libraries, established a Cataloging Commission in 2024. Throughout 2025, this Commission is studying which application profiles to adopt for the following areas (tags refer to MARC21):

1. Dates of birth and death of ancient authors or those with uncertain, probable, or period-based dates (tag 046 in authority records). Authors whose dates are not precise even to the year—typically ancient authors—are being considered. Taking into account the reference sources listed in the “URBE Local Variants” and the EDTF format, ongoing work is establishing criteria for representing cases of probable, uncertain, or floruit dates in tag 046 subfields f, g, s, and t.
2. Coordinated use of occupation (tag 374) and field of activity (tag 372 in authority records). Guidelines are being established for the use of tag 372 when tag 374 is present.
3. Relationship terms and codes (subfields \$e of tags 700 and 710 in bibliographic records). A decision is being made to improve and fix the relationship terms and codes used in URBE, also in light of changes introduced by the Library of Congress in March 2025 in <https://id.loc.gov/vocabulary/relators/aui.html>, where some codes were deprecated and others introduced (e.g., *aui* "author of introduction" was deprecated, and *wfw* "writer of foreword", *win* "writer of introduction", *wpr* "writer of preface" were added).

Netherlands:

- The RDA commissie Netherlands published the 14th article in the series ‘Catalogiseren in het linked-data tijdperk’ about recording IRIs

Scotland:

- The Metadata and Discovery Group in Scotland will be holding an RDA Agony Aunt session on 27th November, featuring an expert panel from the UKCoR Committee (UK Committee on RDA) answering questions, queries and concerns around all things RDA.

Slovenia:

- Since 2016, several working groups have been formed at the National and University Library of Slovenia to prepare the rules according to the RDA standard. A draft structure of the rules has been prepared within these groups. The current working group, i.e. the *Working Group for the Preparation of the Rules for the Description of Resources according to the RDA Standard*, which has been operating since May 2025, is in the final phase of preparing general rules and guidelines (recording methods, data transcription, etc.), and has also begun preparing rules for the description of individual entities. In parallel with the preparation of the rules, coordination and activities for the preparation of the application profile are also underway, in cooperation with the Institute of Information Sciences (IZUM).

Sweden:

- The National Library of Sweden has decided to implement Official RDA. The work will be carried out gradually.

UK:

- The final ‘[Uncataloguing Workshop](#)’ of the year, organized by The UK Committee on RDA ([UKCoR](#)) and the Metadata & Discovery Group ([MDG](#)) in conjunction with The Wales Higher Education Libraries Forum ([WHELP](#)), took place in Cardiff on 25 July 2025 as planned. It has highlighted a need for more.
- Sessions of the MDG [Practical Cataloguing Webinar series](#) all touched upon RDA, some more lightly than others. These are the webinars which have taken place so far:
 - *MDG Practical Cataloguing Webinar 1: Introduction to MARC21 Cataloguing, presented by Will Peaden* - Key MARC21 fields and a practical demonstration of original cataloguing.
 - *MDG Practical Cataloguing Webinar 2: Library of Congress Classification, presented by Concetta La Spada* - Cataloguing e-resources in the MARC21 RDA-compliant format at Cambridge University Press.
 - *MDG Practical Cataloguing Webinar 3: Linked Data, Ontologies and Entity Reconciliation, presented by Fran Frenzel* - How making sense of linked data and ontology terminology can help cataloguers navigate the RDA Toolkit.

Official RDA in Oceania


National and State Libraries Australasia (NSLA) is coordinating the Australia-wide project to transition the library and information sector to Official RDA. The project launched in February 2025, milestones include:

- Representatives from AIATSIS and CAUL are members of the Policy Statement Working Group.
- The draft Metadata Application Profiles (MAPs) are complete.
- The Metadata Application Profile Working Group Co-Leads alongside the Project Manager are undertaking MAP community consultation throughout September.
- The Project Manager is investigating options to share the completed documentation with the Australian library sector.
- AIATSIS has joined the project by becoming a member of the Official RDA Steering Group.

The National Library of New Zealand has posted their training materials online and continue to develop more resources to support cataloguers using Official RDA. These include foundational modules as well as content focussed on New Zealand's guidance on serial works, archived websites, music scores and parallel aggregates.
